
We offered as much free programming as possible and were happy to have regular drop-in hours at the McConnell Mansion thanks to our wonderful volunteer docents. We had over 1,350 museum visitors across 23 states and 4 countries. We directed internships for 5 students, gave 12 specialty tours of the Mansion to school groups and community organizations, hosted our regular events like the Ice Cream Social and Victorian Christmas, plus new ones like the Pie Party! and created 3 different exhibits. The Latah County Historical Foundation ended the year with a balance of \$1,270,349. The Foundation continues to support the Society.

In 2024, LCHF provided the Society with \$50,000 for operations, plus an additional \$28,000 from certificates of deposit. The distribution policy states that the Foundation's annual payout cannot exceed the lesser of a) 5% of the balance of the portfolio or b) 4.6% of the five year average balance of the portfolio.



HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2024

In 2024 LCHS hosted many of its treasured annual events. The Ice Cream Social, Victorian Christmas, a Suds with a Scholar event, and the Historic Recipe Challenge at the Latah County Fair were all big successes. We provided articles for local publications, continued to have strong attendance at monthly Lula's Library book club meetings, created "Those Wacky Victorians: Late 1800s Hobbies" exhibit and parlor talks, displayed the Rick Jones photography show at the Moscow Chamber of Commerce, and the Pie Party! fundraiser. We received several grants for the McConnell Mansion Window Project, completed Phase One, and began Phase Two of the museum restoration.
